From the Principal



Dear Stella Alumna
Last year was an
unprecedented year for the
College, and for Australia.
In Term 1, the College had
to close its doors and move
to on-line learning. The
courage and determination
of both our students and
staff, ensured the fabric of

our community remained strong. Once we returned to school, everyone had new protocols around sanitizing and keeping the community safe with social distancing. Key events such as Year 12 Graduation and end of year awards had to be done differently.

Now, as we look out at the rest of the world, we are alert to the changing environment around us. The world has faced a pandemic, rising tension between the leaders of great nations, renewed calls for action on climate change and the spread of the #MeToo and #BlackLivesMatter movements. Our world, our future, needs people with vision and courage to take us forward as community.

When John Bede Polding (who co-founded the Good Samaritan Sisters with Mother Scholastica Gibbon) arrived in Australia in 1835, he imagined a better world where, like the Good Samaritan, we safeguard those who are more vulnerable. Polding challenged the colonial community to

respond to concerns he raised about the first peoples of Australia, 'the aborigines of the country, the first occupants of the lands over which your flocks and herds now roam have a very strong claim upon you. Nor will the Lord hold you innocent if you have not used your best endeavours to promote their temporal and eternal wellbeing.'

Polding understood the responsibility we have to protect the rights of others in our community. With the rise of the #BlackLivesMatter protests last year it is clear we still have much to do to meet the needs of our indigenous sisters and brothers here in Australia. The challenge is there for us all to live up to Polding's words.

I encourage you, as a valued Stella Alumna, to remain connected to our thriving Benedictine Good Samaritan community. Follow us on Facebook and connect with us through alumnae activities as they arise.

This year is our 90th since the College opened in 1931. We are doing some conservation work in the Chapel and we would love you to visit once that has been completed.

Over the next ten years we will be holding milestone events which we will let you know about through our Facebook site, emails and IOGD.



Recent Building Works 2018 - 2021

Chapel Restoration 2020/21

The Chapel has been plagued by water problems for many years. Rising damp and a leaking roof brought it to the top of the 'to do' list. The structural problems along with some very unsympathetic updates in the 1960s and later had to be addressed in accordance with its heritage listing, so today the Chapel is almost fully restored, including re-leading the stained glass windows, interior painting, woodwork and a new slate roof.




A Much-Needed Makeover 2018

Remnants of the original sandstone nine-pointed star remain in situ beneath the timber-decked quad. The heritage-listed Port Jackson figs are still the heart of Stella, having stood for over 150 years. (See photos on page 1.)

Scholastica Building 2018

Our Science labs hadn't been updated since the 1960s and 70s, the Library was way too small for the current number of students, the Staff have been making do with inadequate work space and common area for decades and IT services didn't have a proper home at all. And so was born 'Scholastica', built on the footprint of the old hall/D block. Three storeys of heaven!

Houses 2014

As the school population grew it became necessary to create more Houses that were easier to manage by their Year 12 House Captains. In 2014 eight women who have made a substantial contribution to Stella Maris or to Australian society in general were chosen as the role models for our Houses.





College Crest 2014

As part of a wider refresh the crest received a makeover. The design committee were concerned to modernise the image but also honour the long history of the original crest. Some elements were retained and modernised - the star, shield, banner and name. The Benedictine cross was added, sitting atop the 'Mound' and the focus of the school colours shifted to the maroon, which was adopted in the late 1990s, but also kept the dark green, the core of our colour palette.



Pants, hat and shorts! 2020/2021

Long gone are the days when society deemed that a woman wasn't dressed properly unless she was wearing a skirt or dress. Back in the late 1970s the Sisters were way ahead of the times when they allowed senior girls to wear long green pants and a beige polo neck jumper. Our current Principal was part of that era and now the pants have returned along with a new style shirt, dress shorts for summer and a very stylish hat, which the girls think looks great. The pants are dark green with a very fine cream and maroon pin stripe - that unfortunately doesn't show up well in photos so there's a close up of the fabric here for you! Shorts are the same.



Snapshots in Time

Did you know that originally Stella Maris was called Star of the Sea and it was an industrial school and orphanage? The Stella Maris we know came into being in 1931 but from 1881, when the estate was purchased, the Sisters cared for orphans and neglected girls. Before the age of 14, the official school leaving age, the girls were taught all the usual subjects. After finishing school they were trained in domestic tasks as this was their best chance of gaining employment and a way out of poverty. Here is an extract from an interview with one of the Sisters and observations by a journalist, Daily Telegraph, 1904:

"And what becomes of them when they have passed through the school?"

'We take them to the laundry. They are also taught cooking and housework. It is our aim to make them thoroughly competent and self-supporting.'

The big well-ventilated workroom was lined with bright-faced girls, working the sewing machines under the direction of an energetic Sister, who seemed to infuse her own enthusiasm into her young disciples. One of the girls was busy cutting out shirts with the skill of a practised hand. Piles of garments were heaped on the upper tables waiting to be pressed. Every detail was managed by the girls themselves.

In another room, girls were employed on hand-sewn articles. Sheets, hem-stitched and embroidered, an order from a Sydney shop - were proudly displayed. They undertake any kind of work - hand or machine - house linen, under-clothing, shirts, layettes, etc. And the knitting! All sorts and sizes of hose were shown - warm, ribbed, useful socks for winter wear; plaids and tartans and heather mixture, and the finest open work, looking as if fairy fingers must have held the needles.

'Where does the singing come from?'

'From the work-room. The girls often sing at their work. Come and see.'

The Sister-in-charge had gone out of the room, but the girls were still working at their machines, and, above the whirr of the needle, came the rich full tones of beautifully-trained voices. Moving away to the laundry, the tuneful sounds followed us. They seemed very happy and to love their work. To be excluded from the work-room is the worst punishment they know."

History Closeup

In 2020 this small hand-cobbled shoe was found buried under the Chapel. The best date we can give it is around 1888 from a photo we have, meaning it would have belonged to an orphan. There was a tradition brought to the colony from England of burying a shoe under or in the walls of new buildings. It is generally accepted this was to keep malevolent spirits away. Lots of people have suggested we put it back!




