Please be aware that the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) has changed the way NAPLAN results are communicated, reflecting a new, more rigorous national standard. There are now four levels of achievement, replacing the previous 10-band structure.

Exceeding > demonstrating proficiency Strong

Needs additional support > has not yet met proficiency



May they waken that in you which is deeper than fact, truer than fiction, full of faith.



### Refugee Week and World Refugee Day - Tuesday 20 June

On Tuesday, Year 9 students Primrose R, Elena G, Zara D and Macey T travelled to St Scholastica's, Glebe to participate in a community conversation with people seeking asylum hosted by the Sisters of the Good Samaritan Refugee and Asylum Seeker Network. The girls listened to personal stories of two asylum seekers, Idrissa from Sierra Leone and Dindo from the Philippines who are supported by Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS).

Idrissa was once a teacher in his homeland and was an active advocate for the rights of women and girls in Sierra Leone. He particularly

advocated to stop the cultural practice of female genital mutilation (FGM).

His advocacy led to him being persecuted by the Sierra Leone government and he had to flee for his life, leaving his young family and all his belongings behind. Idrissa articulated to the students that since having come to Australia he mistakenly thought he would be able to seek safety and shelter to begin to rebuild his life free from persecution, however he is on a temporary visa and this has him held in a state of limbo. Idrissa's visa status results in him being unable to gain full time permanent employment and he can't even hold an opal card and must reapply every 6 months to receive Medicare if he gets sick and needs access to medicine.

Dindo came to Australia with his wife and two young children under a false premise, peddled by a human trafficker who promised full time employment, a house and community to thrive in. Upon arrival in Australia, Dindo and his family faced the harrowing reality that they had been trafficked into slave labour and left with nothing, with all their documentation and passports withheld until they "worked" off their debt. Similarly, to Idrissa, Dindo is on a temporary visa and faces exclusion from Australian society due to this fact.

All of Year 9 had the chance to listen to Helen from Iraq who had to flee from the threat of the terrorist organisation of ISIS. Helen was granted temporary visa status in Australia; however, her sisters were sent to different countries for safety such as Canada and New Zealand. In terms of the temporary visa status, Helen is kept apart from her family which is very difficult for her. The Year 9 cohort, Macey, Elena, Primrose, and Zara should all be commended for the close attention they gave to the speakers. The girls asked poignant questions such as "what can we do as a school community to help Asylum Seekers and Refugees"?

Primrose elaborated by stating: "I got the chance to consider more deeply what it means to be an asylum seeker and the Australian laws that have such a big impact upon people in that situation. I was quite shocked by Idrissa's story and the way he had to leave without being able to keep in communication with his family, especially his children, as it would put them in danger. Idrissa's story really put the freedoms that I have now into perspective."

Elena reflected that she would like to do more to speak up and support refugees and asylum seekers such as supporting initiatives that JRS run to help make a difference in these people's lives.

### Zara added:

"I was made aware of Australia's harsh laws regarding Refugees and Asylum Seekers and how they feel that they are treated like a "criminal" for wanting to seek safety and a chance to live free and that they worry they will never be accepted as an Australian citizen. I felt more informed about people who are forcibly displaced from their homelands and are searching for safety".

### Macey reflected:

"I was informed about the on-going challenges and hardships that Asylum Seekers face even after they have escaped direct persecution through the very harsh and brutal laws in Australia that keeps them in limbo, like being an invisible citizen on the temporary visas. I felt like I was really lucky to be simply born an Australian citizen and I want to do something to help break down the stigma and indefinite waiting period for asylum seekers on the temporary visas."

I was very impressed with the girl's ability to engage with meaningful discussion with Idrissa, Dindo and Helen on these significant social justice issues in our community.
